For all practical reasons all the switches in this series will simply be referred to as the **Switch** throughout this manual. All example screenshots are taken from the **DGS-3000-28XMP** switch.

Safety Instructions

Use the following safety guidelines to ensure your own personal safety and to help protect your system from potential damage. Throughout this safety section, the caution icon () is used to indicate precautions that need to be reviewed and followed.

Safety Precautions

To reduce the risk of bodily injury, electrical shock, fire, and damage to the equipment observe the following precautions:

- Observe and follow service markings.
- Do not service any product except as explained in the system documentation.
- Opening or removing covers that are marked with the triangular symbol with a lightning bolt may expose the
 user to electrical shock.
 - Only a trained service technician should service components inside these compartments.
- If any of the following conditions occur, unplug the product from the electrical outlet and replace the part or contact your trained service provider:
 - o Damage to the power cable, extension cable, or plug.
 - An object has fallen into the product.
 - The product has been exposed to water.
 - o The product has been dropped or damaged.
 - o The product does not operate correctly when the operating instructions are correctly followed.
- Keep your system away from radiators and heat sources. Also, do not block cooling vents.
- Do not push any objects into the openings of the system. Doing so can cause fire or electric shock by shorting out interior components.
- Use the product only with approved equipment.
- Allow the product to cool before removing covers or touching internal components.
- Operate the product only from the type of external power source indicated on the electrical ratings label. If unsure of the type of power source required, consult your service provider or local power company.
- To help avoid damaging the system, be sure the voltage selection switch (if provided) on the power supply is set to match the power available at the Switch's location:
 - 115 volts (V)/60 hertz (Hz) in most of North and South America and some Far Eastern countries such as South Korea and Taiwan
 - o 100 V/50 Hz in eastern Japan and 100 V/60 Hz in western Japan
 - o 230 V/50 Hz in most of Europe, the Middle East, and the Far East
- Also, be sure that attached devices are electrically rated to operate with the power available in your location.
- Use only approved power cable(s). If you have not been provided with a power cable for your system or for any AC-powered option intended for your system, purchase a power cable that is approved for use in your country. The power cable must be rated for the product and for the voltage and current marked on the product's electrical ratings label. The voltage and current rating of the cable should be greater than the ratings marked on the product.
- To help prevent electric shock, plug the system and peripheral power cables into properly grounded electrical outlets. These cables are equipped with three-prong plugs to help ensure proper grounding. Do not use adapter plugs or remove the grounding prong from a cable. If using an extension cable is necessary, use a 3-wire cable with properly grounded plugs.
- Observe extension cable and power strip ratings. Make sure that the total ampere rating of all products plugged into the extension cable or power strip does not exceed 80 percent of the ampere ratings limit for the extension cable or power strip.
- To help protect the system from sudden, transient increases and decreases in electrical power, use a surge suppressor, line conditioner, or uninterruptible power supply (UPS).
- Position system cables and power cables carefully; route cables so that they cannot be stepped on or tripped over. Be sure that nothing rests on any cables.
- Do not modify power cables or plugs. Consult a licensed electrician or your power company for site modifications. Always follow your local/national wiring rules.
- When connecting or disconnecting power to hot-pluggable power supplies, if offered with your system, observe the following guidelines:
 - o Install the power supply before connecting the power cable to the power supply.
 - Unplug the power cable before removing the power supply.
 - If the system has multiple sources of power, disconnect power from the system by unplugging all power cables from the power supplies.

 Move products with care; ensure that all casters and/or stabilizers are firmly connected to the system. Avoid sudden stops and uneven surfaces.

General Precautions for Rack-Mountable Products

Observe the following precautions for rack stability and safety. Also, refer to the rack installation documentation accompanying the system and the rack for specific caution statements and procedures.

• Systems are considered to be components in a rack. Thus, "component" refers to any system as well as to various peripherals or supporting hardware.



CAUTION: Installing systems in a rack without the front and side stabilizers installed could cause the rack to tip over, potentially resulting in bodily injury under certain circumstances. Therefore, always install the stabilizers before installing components in the rack. After installing system/components in a rack, never pull more than one component out of the rack on its slide assemblies at one time. The weight of more than one extended component could cause the rack to tip over and may result in serious injury.

- Before working on the rack, make sure that the stabilizers are secured to the rack, extended to the floor, and that the full weight of the rack rests on the floor. Install front and side stabilizers on a single rack or front stabilizers for joined multiple racks before working on the rack.
- Always load the rack from the bottom up, and load the heaviest item in the rack first.
- Make sure that the rack is level and stable before extending a component from the rack.
- Use caution when pressing the component rail release latches and sliding a component into or out of a rack;
 the slide rails can pinch your fingers.
- After a component is inserted into the rack, carefully extend the rail into a locking position, and then slide the component into the rack.
- Do not overload the AC supply branch circuit that provides power to the rack. The total rack load should not exceed 80 percent of the branch circuit rating.
- Ensure that proper airflow is provided to components in the rack.
- Do not step on or stand on any component when servicing other components in a rack.



NOTE: A qualified electrician must perform all connections to DC power and to safety grounds. All electrical wiring must comply with applicable local or national codes and practices.



CAUTION: Never defeat the ground conductor or operate the equipment in the absence of a suitably installed ground conductor. Contact the appropriate electrical inspection authority or an electrician if uncertain that suitable grounding is available.



CAUTION: The system chassis must be positively grounded to the rack cabinet frame. Do not attempt to connect power to the system until grounding cables are connected. Completed power and safety ground wiring must be inspected by a qualified electrical inspector. An energy hazard will exist if the safety ground cable is omitted or disconnected.

Protecting Against Electrostatic Discharge

Static electricity can harm delicate components inside the system. To prevent static damage, discharge static electricity from your body before touching any of the electronic components, such as the microprocessor. This can be done by periodically touching an unpainted metal surface on the chassis.

The following steps can also be taken to prevent damage from electrostatic discharge (ESD):

- When unpacking a static-sensitive component from its shipping carton, do not remove the component from
 the antistatic packing material until ready to install the component in the system. Just before unwrapping the
 antistatic packaging, be sure to discharge static electricity from your body.
- When transporting a sensitive component, first place it in an antistatic container or packaging.
- Handle all sensitive components in a static-safe area. If possible, use antistatic floor pads, workbench pads and an antistatic grounding strap.

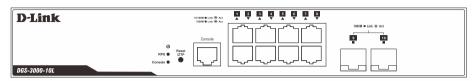


Figure 1-1 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-10L Switch

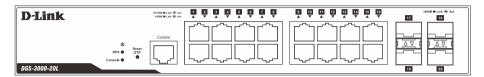


Figure 1-2 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-20L Switch

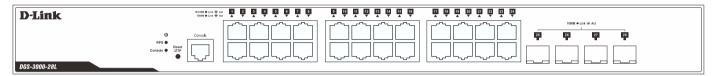


Figure 1-3 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-28L Switch

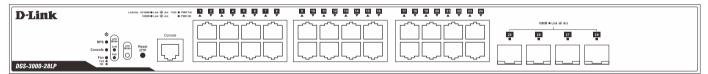


Figure 1-4 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-28LP Switch

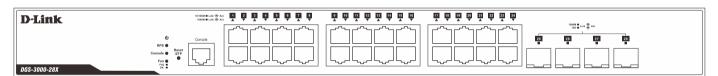


Figure 1-5 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-28X Switch

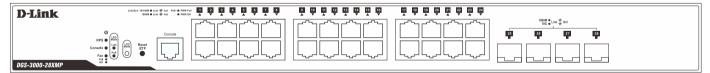


Figure 1-6 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-28XMP Switch

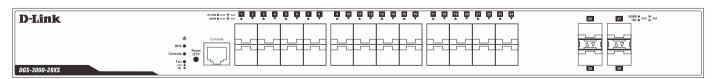


Figure 1-7 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-28XS Switch

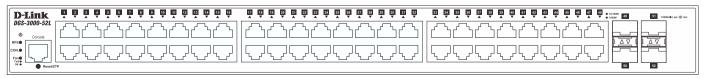


Figure 1-8 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-52L Switch

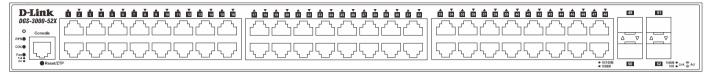


Figure 1-10 Front panel view of a DGS-3000-52X (HW: B2) Switch

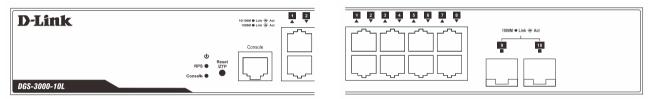


Figure 1-11 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-10L Switch

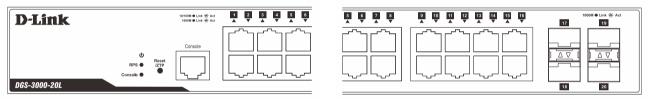


Figure 1-12 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-20L Switch

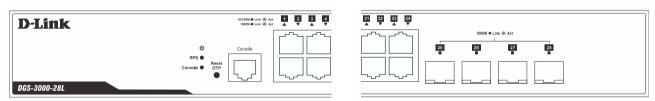


Figure 1-13 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-28L Switch

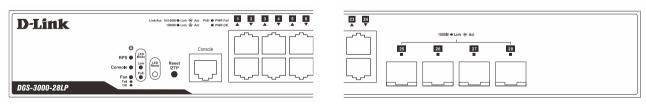


Figure 1-14 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-28LP Switch

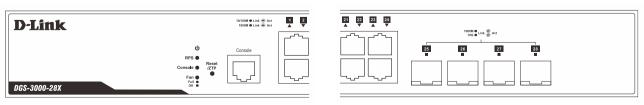
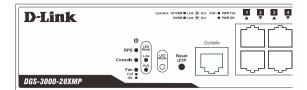


Figure 1-15 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-28X Switch



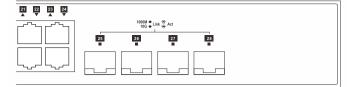


Figure 1-16 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-28XMP Switch



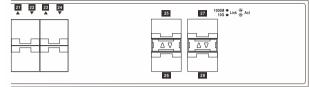
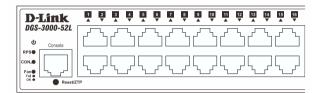


Figure 1-17 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-28XS Switch



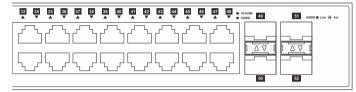
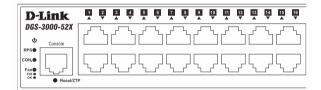


Figure 1-18 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-52L Switch



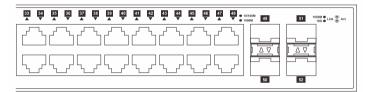
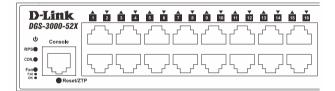


Figure 1-19 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-52X (HW: B1) Switch



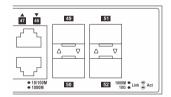


Figure 1-20 LED indicators for a DGS-3000-52X (HW: B2) Switch

The following table describes the LED indicators in more detail.

LED	Description
Power	This LED will light green after powering the Switch on to indicate the ready state of the device. The indicator is off when the Switch is no longer receiving power (i.e. powered off).
RPS	This LED will light green if the Redundant Power Supply (RPS) is in use. If the indicator is off, the RPS is not in use.
Console	This LED will blink green during the Power-On Self Test (POST). When the POST is finished, the LED will turn off. The indicator will light steady green when a user is logged in through the console port.
Fan	This LED will light green after the diagnostics have passed with no errors. This LED is steady red when any of the fans fail.
Link/Act LEDs	The Switch has LED indicators for Link and Activity.
	Copper Ports: The LED will light steady green when there is a secure connection (or link) to a 1000Mbps Ethernet device or steady orange when there is a secure connection (or link) to a 10/100Mbps Ethernet device at any of the copper ports. The

	LED will blink green when a 1000Mbps port is active or blink orange when a 10/100Mbps port is active. The LED remains off when there is no link or activity. SFP Ports: The LED will light steady green when there is a secure connection (or link) to a 1000Mbps Ethernet device at any of the SFP ports. The LED remains off when there is no link or activity.
	SFP+ Ports: The LED will light steady green when there is a secure connection (or link) to a 10Gbps Ethernet device or steady orange when there is a secure connection (or link) to a 1Gbps Ethernet device at any of the SFP+ ports. The LED will blink green when a 10Gbps port is active or blink orange when a 1Gbps port is active. The LED remains off when there is no link or activity.
PoE (DGS-3000-28LP and DGS-3000-28XMP only)	When this light is on with a solid green light, it means that the corresponding ports are feeding power to the PoE devices plugged in. When this light is on with a solid orange light, it means that the port is in an error condition state. When this light is off, it means that the ports are not supplying power to the devices plugged into the ports.

Reset/ZTP

The Reset/ZTP button is used to restart the Switch, initiate the Zero Touch Provisioning (ZTP) function, or to factory reset the Switch. The press and hold during of the Reset/ZTP button will determine which of the three functions will be executed. Press and hold the Reset/ZTP button:

- For less than 5 seconds to restart the Switch. Unsaved software modifications will be lost.
- For more than 5 seconds and less than 10 seconds to initiate the ZTP function.
 - The LEDs on the front panel of the Switch will light green when ZTP is processing. After the image and/or configuration file(s) was downloaded successfully, the Switch will restart and use the new image and/or configuration file(s).
 - The LEDs on the front panel of the Switch will light amber when ZTP failed. To recover the LEDs to the normal state, press the Reset/ZTP button again.
- For more than 10 seconds to factory reset the Switch. All software settings will return the factory default settings. After this the Switch will restart.

Rear Panel Components

The rear panel of switches in this series features an AC power socket, power cord clip hole, a DC power RPS port with an ON/OFF toggle switch, a security lock, and an electrical grounding point. The DC power RPS port can be used to either supply power to the Switch from a DC power supply or from an RPS.

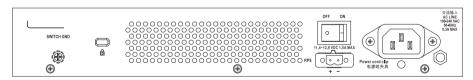


Figure 1-21 Rear panel view of a DGS-3000-10L Switch

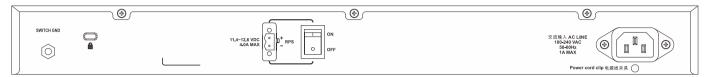


Figure 1-24 Rear panel view of a DGS-3000-28LP Switch

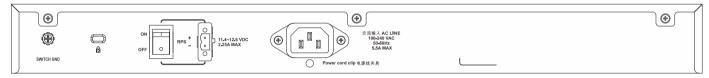


Figure 1-26 Rear panel view of a DGS-3000-28XMP Switch

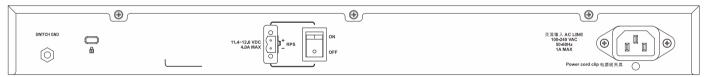


Figure 1-28 Rear panel view of a DGS-3000-52L Switch

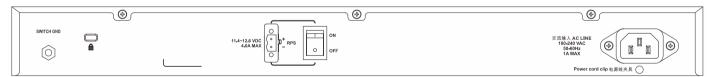


Figure 1-29 Rear panel view of a DGS-3000-52X (HW: B1) Switch

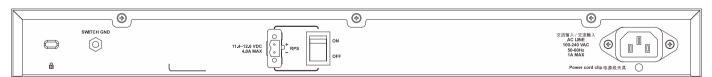


Figure 1-30 Rear panel view of a DGS-3000-52X (HW: B2) Switch

The AC power socket is a standard three-pronged connector that supports the power cord. Plug-in the female connector of the provided power cord into this socket, and the male side of the cord into a power outlet. The Switch automatically adjusts the power setting to any supply voltage in the range from 100 to 240 VAC at 50 to 60 Hz.

The electrical grounding point, on the back panel, and the protective ground connector in the AC power socket are connected. We'll simply refer to this shared connection and Ground (GND). Surge protection in the Switch allows for 2 KV surges between the Line/Single-phase/Hot (L) wire and the Neutral (N) wire, 4 KV surges between the L/N wires and Ground (GND), and 6 KV surges between the Ethernet ports and Ground (GND).

An optional external RPS can be plugged into the RPS port. When the internal power fails, this optional external RPS will take over all the power immediately and automatically.

For more information about installing the DC power supply, refer to **Power On (DC Power)** on page 24.

Side Panel Components

The side panels of switches in this series contain heat vents, fans, and rack-mounting screw holes. The heat vents are used to dissipate internal heat and facilitate internal air circulation. Do not block these openings. Leave at least 6 inches of space at the rear and sides of the Switch for proper ventilation. Without proper heat dissipation and air circulation, system components might overheat which could lead to system failure or even severely damaged components.

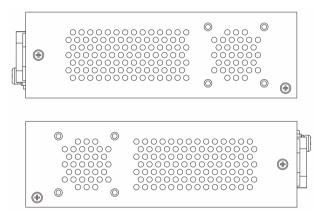


Figure 1-31 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-10L Switch

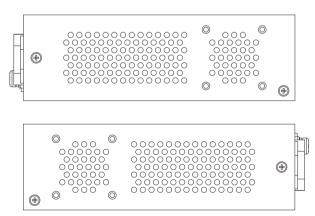


Figure 1-32 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-20L Switch

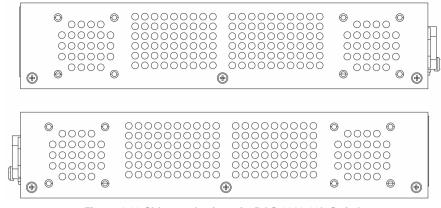


Figure 1-33 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-28L Switch

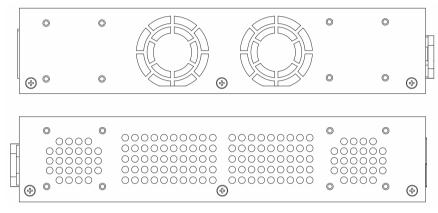


Figure 1-34 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-28LP Switch

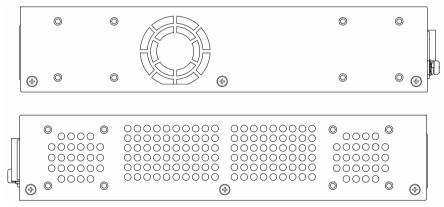


Figure 1-35 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-28X Switch

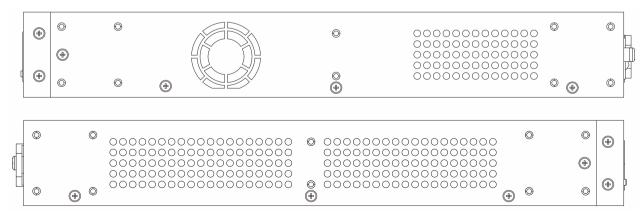


Figure 1-36 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-28XMP Switch

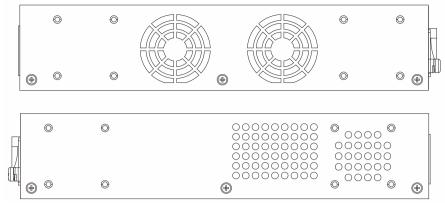


Figure 1-37 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-28XS Switch

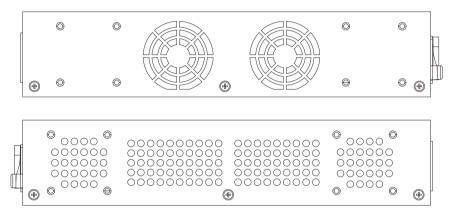


Figure 1-38 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-52L Switch

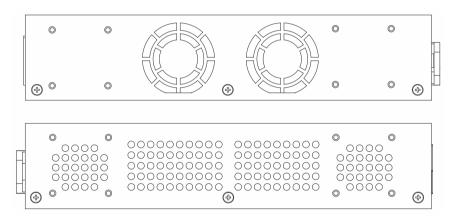


Figure 1-39 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-52X (HW: B1) Switch

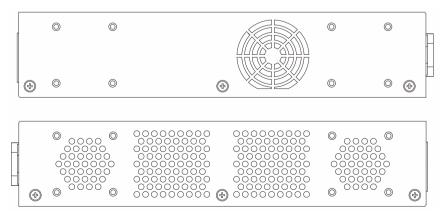


Figure 1-40 Side panels view of a DGS-3000-52X (HW: B2) Switch

Switches in this series include **smart fans** that will automatically change their speed depending on the internal temperature detected by the sensors built-in the Switch's hardware.

Installation Guidelines

When installing this Switch, follow these guidelines:

- Install the Switch in a fairly cool and dry place for the acceptable temperature and humidity operating ranges.
- Visually inspect the power cord and see that it is fully secured to the AC power port.
- The power outlet should be within 1.82 meters (6 feet) of the Switch.
- Make sure that there is proper heat dissipation from and adequate ventilation around the Switch. Leave at least 10 cm (4 inches) of space at the front and rear of the Switch for ventilation.
- Install the Switch in a site free from strong electromagnetic field generators (such as motors), vibration, dust, and direct exposure to sunlight.



NOTE: Please review the Installation Guidelines above before installing the Switch.

Installing the Switch without a Rack

When installing the switch in an area other than inside a switch rack, like on a desktop, rubber feet can be attached to the bottom panel of the switch. On the bottom panel of the switch, there are clearly marked squares where the rubber feet can be attached. These marked squares are usually found close to the corners of the switch's bottom panel.

Adhesive material is included on the rubber feet. Simply pull away the protective sticker, of each rubber foot and then attach the foot into the appropriately marked square. The rubber feet cushion the switch, protecting the casing from scratches and preventing it from scratching other surfaces.

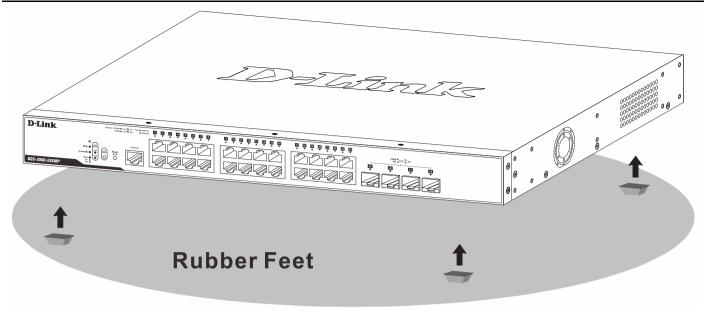


Figure 2-1 Attaching rubber feet to the Switch

Install the Switch on a sturdy, level surface that can support at least 5 kg (11 lb). Do not place heavy objects on the Switch.

Installing the Switch in a Standard 19" Rack

The Switch can be mounted in a standard 19" rack using the rack-mount brackets included in the package. Use the following diagrams as a guide.

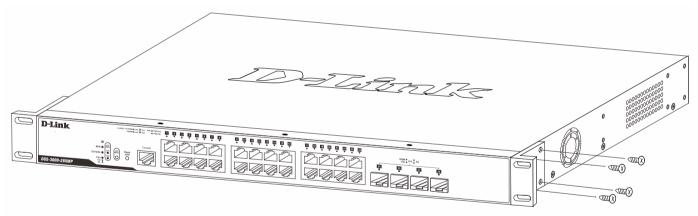


Figure 2–2 Attaching rack-mount brackets to the Switch

Fasten the rack-mount brackets to the Switch using the screws provided. With the brackets attached securely, the Switch can be mounted in a standard 19" rack, as shown below.

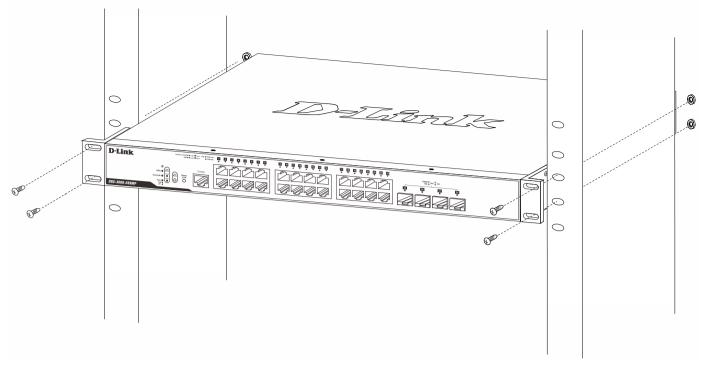


Figure 2-3 Installing the Switch in a Rack



CAUTION: Installing systems in a rack without the front and side stabilizers installed could cause the rack to tip over, potentially resulting in bodily injury under certain circumstances. Therefore, always install the stabilizers before installing components in the rack. After installing components in a rack, do not pull more than one component out of the rack on its slide assemblies at one time. The weight of more than one extended component could cause the rack to tip over and may result in injury.

Installing Transceivers into the Transceiver Ports

The Switch is equipped with Small Form-factor Pluggable (SFP) and Enhanced Small Form-factor Pluggable (SFP+) ports, which are used with fiber-optical transceiver cabling. SFP/SFP+ ports support full-duplex transmissions, autonegotiation, and can be uplinked with various other switches across the network. The SFP ports support data rates of up to 1Gbps and the SFP+ ports support data rates of up to 1Gbps.

See the figure below for installing an SFP+ transceiver into an SFP+ transceiver port on the Switch.

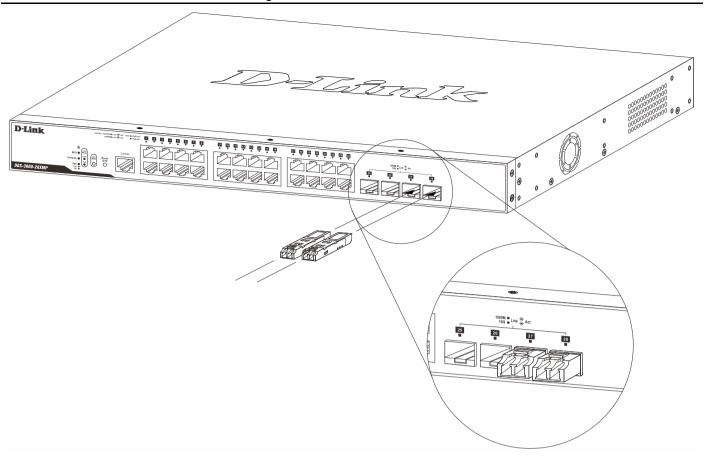


Figure 2-4 Inserting an SFP+ transceiver into an SFP+ transceiver port

For a full list of supported transceivers, compatible with switches in this series, refer to **Port Functions** on page 42.

Power On (AC Power)

Plug one end of the AC power cord into the AC power port of the Switch and the other end into the local power source outlet. After the system powered on, the LED's will blink green to indicate that the system is booting up.

Power Failure (AC Power)

In the event of a power failure, just as a precaution, unplug the power cord from the Switch. After the power returns, plug the power cord back into the power port of the Switch.

Installing the Power Cord Clip

To prevent the accidental removal of the AC power cord, it is recommended to install the power cord clip together with the power cord.

1. With the rough side facing down, insert the Tie Wrap into the hole below the power socket.

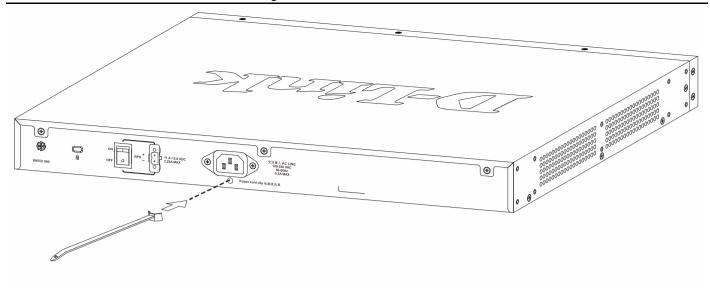


Figure 2-5 Inserting the tie wrap

2. Plug the AC power cord into the power socket of the Switch.

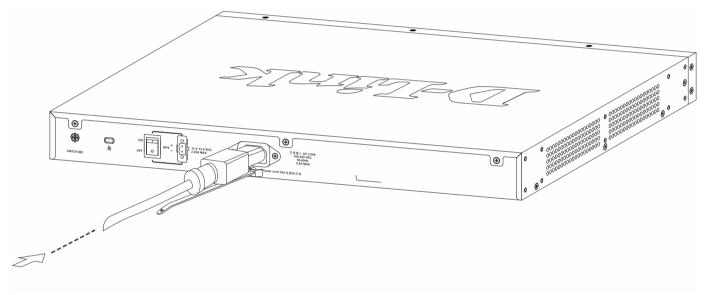


Figure 2-6 Inserting the power cord

3. Slide the Retainer through the Tie Wrap until the end of the cord.

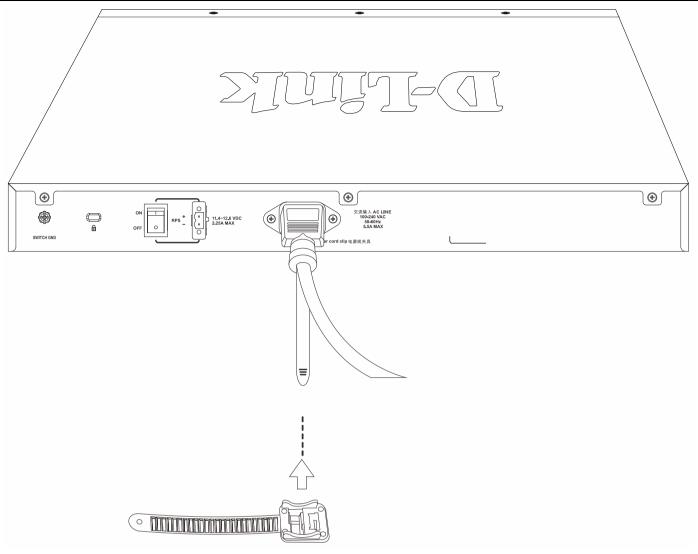


Figure 2-7 Sliding the retainer through the tie wrap

4. Circle the tie of the Retainer around the power cord and into the locker of the Retainer.

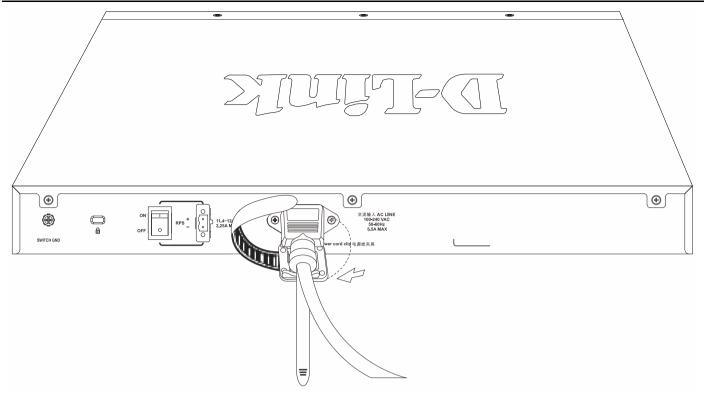


Figure 2-8 Circling around the power cord

5. Fasten the tie of the Retainer until the power cord is secured.

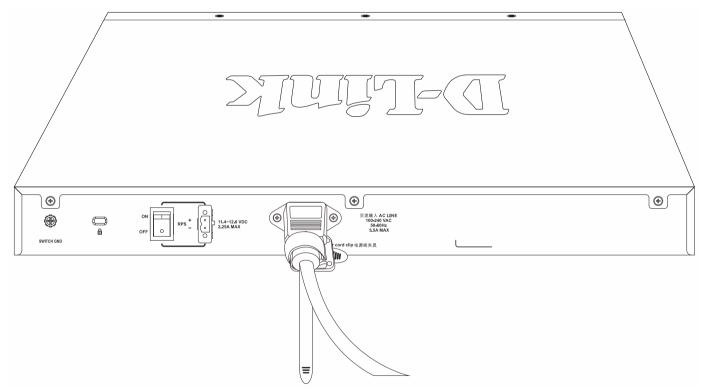


Figure 2-9 Securing the power cord

Power On (DC Power)

The Switch provides a DC power port to connect to any DC power source. The DC power source must meet the following requirements:

The DC power source's output voltage must be between 11.4V and 12.6V.

- The DC power source's output current rate must be higher than or equal to 2.5A.
- Voltage protection must be applied when the voltage is higher than or equal to 15V.
- Current protection must be applied when the current is higher than or equal to 6A.

When the DGS-3000-28LP and DGS-3000-28XMP switches are powered by the DC power source only, PoE is not supported.

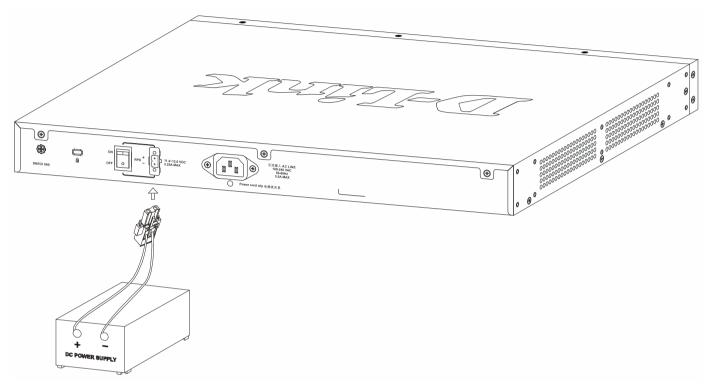


Figure 2-10 Connecting a DC power source to the Switch

- 1. Make sure that the ON/OFF toggle switch on the rear panel of the Switch is turned off.
- Connect one end of the DC power cord to the DC power source. Make sure that connection polarity (positive
 and negative) is correct at both sides before using this feature to avoid any damaged. Connect the other end
 of the DC power cord to the DC power cord's connector. Insert the DC power cord's connector into the DC
 power port on the rear panel of the Switch.
- 3. Turn the ON/OFF toggle switch on.



NOTE: If the AC power supply of the DGS-3000-28LP and DGS-3000-28XMP switches fail and power is supplied by the backup DC power source, these two switches cannot provide PoE power to Powered Devices (PDs).



NOTE: If the DGS-3000-28LP and DGS-3000-28XMP switches are powered on using only a DC power source and after the booting procedure was completed and the AC power returns, power will not be provided to PDs. To return power to PDs, the switches need to be rebooted with the AC power supply as the main power source.

Installing the Redundant Power Supply (RPS)

The RPS is designed to conform to the wattage requirements of D-Link's Ethernet and Gigabit switches. It is an external RPS unit enclosed in solid metal case with sockets to AC or DC power sources on one end, and connect to a switch's internal power supply on the other end. The RPS provides a low-cost, simple solution to the problem of an

inadvertent failure of the internal power-supply of an Ethernet switch, which can result in the shutdown of that switch, the devices attached to its ports, or an entire network.



CAUTION: Do not connect the RPS to AC power before the DC power cable is connected. This might damage the internal power supply.

Connecting the RPS to the RPS Port

The D-Link RPS can be connected to the RPS port of the Switch using the DC power supply cord, called the DPS-CB150-2PS (HW: B1). It is important to notice that the RPS can supply power to one or two DGS-3000 Switches at the same time.

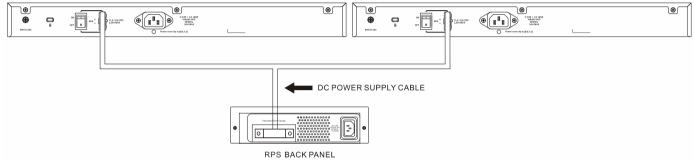


Figure 2-11 Connecting two Switches to the RPS

The following section explains how to connect the RPS to the Switch.

- 1. Disconnect the Switch from the main AC power source.
- 2. Insert the 14-pin end of the DC power supply cord into the RPS and the 2-pin end into the receptacle of the RPS port on the Switch.
- 3. Using a standard AC power cord, connect the RPS to the main AC power source. A green LED on the front panel of the RPS will illuminate to indicate a successful connection.
- 4. Make sure that the ON/OFF toggle switch on the rear panel of the Switch is turned on.
- 5. Re-connect the Switch to the AC power source and power on the RPS.

No configuration is needed in the Switch software for this installation.

Installing the RPS into a Rack-mount Chassis

The D-Link RPS can be installed into D-Link RPS rack-mount chassis unit.



CAUTION: Do not connect the RPS to the AC power before the DC power cable is connected. Connecting the AC power before the DC power is connected might damage the internal power supply.

Chapter 3 Connecting the Switch

Switch to End Node Switch to another Switch Connecting to a Network Backbone or Server

Switch to End Node

An end node can be any networking device, plugged into any of the networking ports of the Switch, where data transmission ends. Typical end nodes are computers. End nodes are generally outfitted with a 10/100/1000Mbps RJ45 Ethernet Network Interface Card (NIC) that can connect to the Switch using a twisted-pair UTP/STP cable. Connect the end node to any of the copper RJ45 ports of the Switch. The Link/Act LEDs for each Ethernet port turns green or amber when the link is active. A blinking LED indicates packet activity on that port.

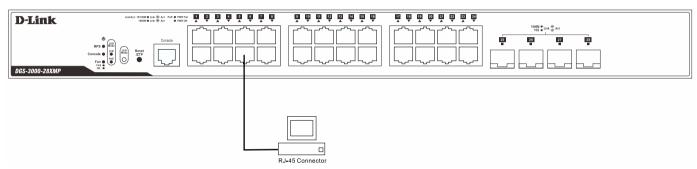


Figure 3-1 Switch to end node connection

Switch to another Switch

There is a great deal of flexibility on how connections are made from the Switch to other switches using the appropriate cabling.

- Connect a 10Mbps switch port to the Switch using a twisted-pair Category 3, 4 or 5 UTP/STP cable.
- Connect a 100Mbps switch port to the Switch using a twisted-pair Category 5 UTP/STP cable.
- Connect a 1000Mbps switch port to the Switch using a twisted pair Category 5e UTP/STP cable.
- Connect a switch supporting a fiber-optic connection to the Switch's SFP/SFP+ ports using SFP/SFP+ transceivers and fiber-optic cabling.

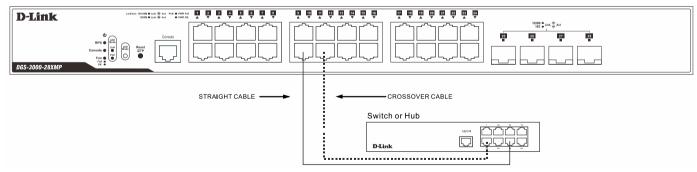


Figure 3-2 Switch to switch connection

Connecting to a Network Backbone or Server

The SFP/SFP+ ports are ideal for connecting a network backbone, server or server farm to the Switch. The SFP/SFP+ ports can operate at speeds of 1/10 Gbps respectively.

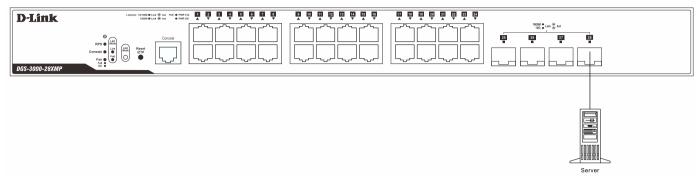


Figure 3-3 Server to Switch Connection

Chapter 4 Introduction to Switch Management

Management Options Connecting to the Console Port SNMP Settings

Management Options

This Switch can be managed Out-Of-Band (OOB) through the console port on the front panel of the Switch or in-band using any of the Copper RJ45 or SFP/SFP+ ports on the front panel.

Command Line Interface (CLI) Management

The Command Line Interface (CLI) can be accessed from any computer running terminal emulation software from its serial port when it is connected to the console port. Alternatively, the CLI can also be accessed using Telnet or SSH client software from a computer to any of the Copper RJ45 or SFP/SFP+ ports.

The CLI provides complete access to all Switch management features. When connecting to the Switch by means of Telnet or SSH, the same CLI can be accessed for Switch management.

For more detailed information about the CLI, refer to the DGS-3000 Series CLI Reference Guide.

SNMP-based Management

The Switch can also be managed with an SNMP-compatible client program. The Switch supports SNMPv1, SNMPv2c, and SNMPv3. The SNMP agent decodes the incoming SNMP messages and responds to requests with MIB objects stored in the database. The SNMP agent updates the MIB objects to generate statistics and counters.

Web-based User Interface (Web UI) Management

The Web User Interface (Web UI) can be accessed from any computer running web browsing software from its LAN port when it is connected to any of the Copper RJ45 or SFP/SFP+ ports. This Switch also supports SSL.

This management interface is a more graphically representation of the features that can be viewed and configured on this Switch. Most of the features available from the CLI can be accessed through the Web UI. Web browsers like Microsoft's Internet Explorer, Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome can be used.

For more detailed information about the Web UI, refer to the DGS-3000 Series Web UI Reference Guide.

Connecting to the Console Port

The front panel of the Switch features a console port that provides an Out-Of-Band (OOB) connection from a computer to the Switch to access the Switch's Command Line Interface (CLI). The console port is an RJ45 port and requires a special cable that is included with the Switch, to establish the physical connection.

To connect to the console port, the following equipment is needed:

- A computer or terminal with both an RS-232 serial port and the ability to emulate a terminal connection.
- A console cable with a male DB-9 connector on one end and an RJ45 connection on the other. This cable should be included with the Switch. It establishes the physical connection to the console port.

Connect the male DB-9 connector of the console cable to the RS-232 serial port on the computer and insert the RJ45 connector into the console port on the front panel of the Switch.

Configure the terminal emulation software to use the following settings:

- Select the appropriate serial port (For example, COM 1).
- Set the Bits per second (data rate) to 115200 baud.
- Set the data format to 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, and no parity.
- Set the flow control to none.
- Under Properties > Settings, select VT100 as the Emulation mode.
- Select Terminal keys for Function, Arrow and Ctrl keys. Make sure that Terminal keys (not Windows keys) are selected.



Figure 4-1 HyperTerminal Connection Properties



NOTE: When using HyperTerminal with the Microsoft Windows 2000 operating system, ensure that the Microsoft Windows 2000 Service Pack 2 or later is installed. This service pack allows the use of arrow keys in HyperTerminal's VT100 emulation.



NOTE: Access to the console port can be made at any time while the Switch is on. There is no need to turn the Switch off when plugging the console cable into the console port.

Connecting to the Switch for the First Time

After successfully connecting to the Switch's console port and the Switch was turned on, the boot-up procedure will be displayed, as shown below.

NOTE: By default, there are no login user accounts configured on this Switch. For security reasons, it is highly recommended to create a login user account for this Switch.

Creating a User Account

This section will discuss how to create a login user account on this Switch. This login details will be applied not only for access to the CLI, but also for access to the Web UI and other interfaces. The same username and password will be used for these connections.

To create a user account, enter the following commands.

In the above example, the **create account** command was used to create a new user account. An admin account was created with the username of 'Administrator'. Immediately after the command was issued, the new password must be entered and verified. Press **Enter** after every step to continue.

For more information about user account creation and management, refer to the DGS-3000 Series CLI Reference Guide and the DGS-3000 Series Web UI Reference Guide.

Configuring the IP Address

Each networking node, within a network, must use a unique IP address. This IP address is used to communicate with other networking devices in the network. The IP address of the Switch is also important to be able to access the Web UI of this Switch.

There are two methods in which a Switch can obtain an IP address.

- From a BOOTP or DHCP server located within the local network.
- By manually configuring the IP address of the Switch through the CLI or Web UI.



NOTE: By default, the Switch's IP address is 10.90.90.90 with a subnet mask of 255.0.0.0.

To find out what the IP address of the Switch is, we can issue the **show ipif** command, as shown below.

In the above example, the Switch's IP interface information is displayed. The IP address for this switch is 10.90.90.90 and the subnet mask is 255.0.0.0.

To change the IP address of this Switch, we can issue the **config ipif** command, as shown below.

In this above example, the Switch's System IP address was changed to 192.168.69.2 and the subnet mask to 255.255.255.0. Note that the CIDR notation method was used to configure the subnet mask. Alternatively, the subnet mask can be typed as per normal if the CIDR notation is unknown. For example, 192.168.69.2/255.255.255.0 would be interpreted the same as 192.168.69.2/24 by the Switch.

For more information about IP address configuration and management, refer to the DGS-3000 Series CLI Reference Guide and the DGS-3000 Series Web UI Reference Guide.

SNMP Settings

The Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) is an OSI Layer 7 (Application Layer) designed specifically for managing and monitoring network devices. SNMP enables network management stations to read and modify the settings of gateways, routers, switches and other network devices. Use SNMP to configure system features for proper operation, monitor performance and detect potential problems in the Switch, switch group or network.

Managed devices that support SNMP include software (referred to as an agent), which runs locally on the device. A defined set of variables (managed objects) is maintained by the SNMP agent and used to manage the device. These objects are defined in a Management Information Base (MIB), which provides a standard presentation of the information controlled by the on-board SNMP agent. SNMP defines both the format of the MIB specifications and the protocol used to access this information over the network.

The Switch supports SNMP versions 1, 2c, and 3. The administrator may specify which SNMP version to use to monitor and control the Switch. The three SNMP versions vary in the level of security provided between the management station and the network device.

In SNMPv1 and SNMPv2c, user authentication is accomplished using 'community strings', which function like passwords. The remote user SNMP application and the Switch SNMP must use the same community string. SNMP packets from any station that has not been authenticated are ignored (dropped).

The default community strings for the Switch used for SNMPv1 and SNMPv2c management access are:

- public Allows authorized management stations to retrieve MIB objects.
- **private** Allows authorized management stations to retrieve and modify MIB objects.

SNMPv3 uses a more sophisticated authentication process that is separated into two parts. The first part is to maintain a list of users and their attributes that are allowed to act as SNMP managers. The second part describes what each user on that list can do as an SNMP manager.

The Switch allows groups of users to be listed and configured with a shared set of privileges. The SNMP version may also be set for a listed group of SNMP managers. Thus, a group of SNMP managers can be created to view read-only information or receive traps using SNMPv1 while assigning a higher level of security to another group, granting read/write privileges using SNMPv3.

Using SNMPv3 individual users or groups of SNMP managers can be allowed to perform or be restricted from performing specific SNMP management functions. The functions allowed or restricted are defined using the Object Identifier (OID) associated with a specific MIB. An additional layer of security is available for SNMPv3 in that SNMP messages may be encrypted.

Traps

Traps are messages that alert network personnel of events that occur on the Switch. The events can be as serious as a reboot (someone accidentally turned OFF the Switch), or less serious like a port status change. The Switch generates traps and sends them to the trap recipient (or network manager). Typical traps include trap messages for Authentication Failure, Topology Change and Broadcast\Multicast Storm.

Management Information Base (MIB)

The Switch in the Management Information Base (MIB) stores management and counter information. The Switch uses the standard MIB-II module. Consequently, values for MIB objects can be retrieved from any SNMP-based network management software. In addition to the standard MIB-II, the Switch also supports its own proprietary enterprise MIB

as an extended Management Information Base. The proprietary MIB may also be retrieved by specifying the MIB's Object Identifier. MIB values can be either read-only or read-write.

Introduction

Most software functions of the Switch can be managed, configured, and monitored via the embedded HTML Webbased User Interface (Web UI). Management can be done on the Switch from remote stations anywhere on the network through a standard web browser. The web browser acts as a universal access tool and can communicate directly with the Switch using the HTTP or HTTPS (SSL) protocol.

The following web browsers are supported:

- Internet Explorer (version 7 and later)
- Firefox
- Google Chrome
- Safari

Logging into the Web UI

To begin managing the Switch, simply run the web browser installed on the computer and enter the IP address of the Switch in the web browser's address bar and press **Enter**. The web browser should translate this to an HTTP request, for example, http://10.90.90.90.

After pressing Enter, the following authentication window should appear, as shown below.



Figure 5-1 Web UI Login Window

When connecting to the Web UI of the Switch for the first time, leave the User name and Password fields blank and click **OK** since there are no login user accounts created by default on this switch. This will open the Web UI.

Web-based User Interface (Web UI)

The Web UI provides access to various Switch configuration and management windows. It allows the user to view performance statistics, and permits graphical monitoring of the system's status.

Areas of the Web UI

After logging into the Switch's Web UI, the following page will be displayed. The Web UI can be divided up into three distinct areas, and they are described in more detail in the table below.

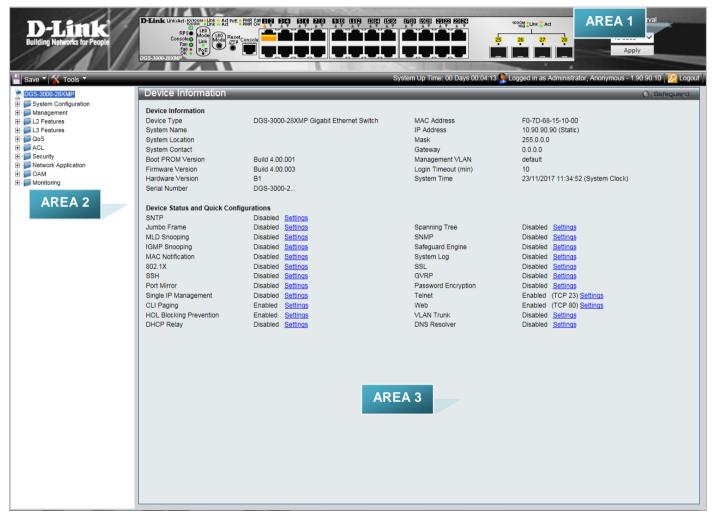


Figure 5-2 Main Web UI Window

Area	Function
AREA 1	In this area a graphical near real-time image of the front panel of the Switch is displayed. This area displays the Switch's ports and expansion modules and shows port activity, depending on the specified mode. Some management functions, including port monitoring are accessible here. Click the D-Link logo to go to the D-Link Website.
AREA 2	In this area, folders and window links are available for selection. Software features, that can be configured or monitored on this Switch, are grouped together in folders based on protocol and feature categories. Selecting a window link in this area, will change the display window of area 3.
AREA 3	In this area physical configuration, management, and monitoring can be done to software features available in the Web UI of this Switch.

Web Pages

In area 2, mentioned above, the following main folders will be available for selecting.

Folder Name	Description
System Configuration	In this folder features regarding the Switch's configuration can be viewed and configured.
Management	In this folder features regarding the Switch's management can be viewed and configured.

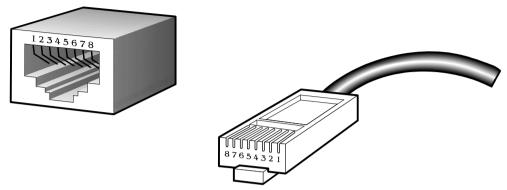


Figure B-1 Standard RJ45 port and connector

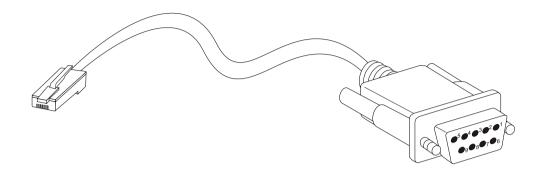


Figure B-2 Console-to-RJ45 Cable

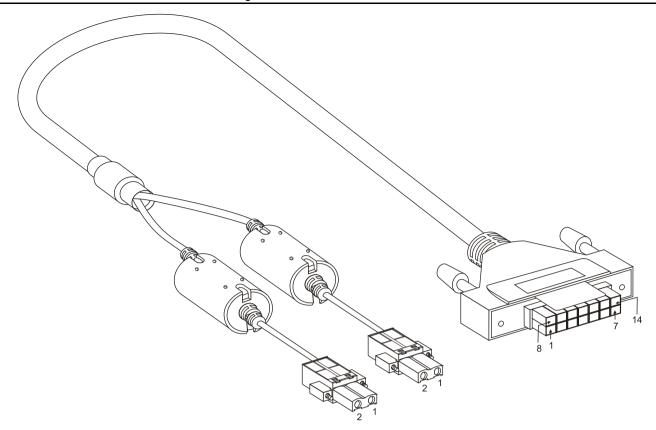


Figure B-3 DPS-CB150-2PS Cable

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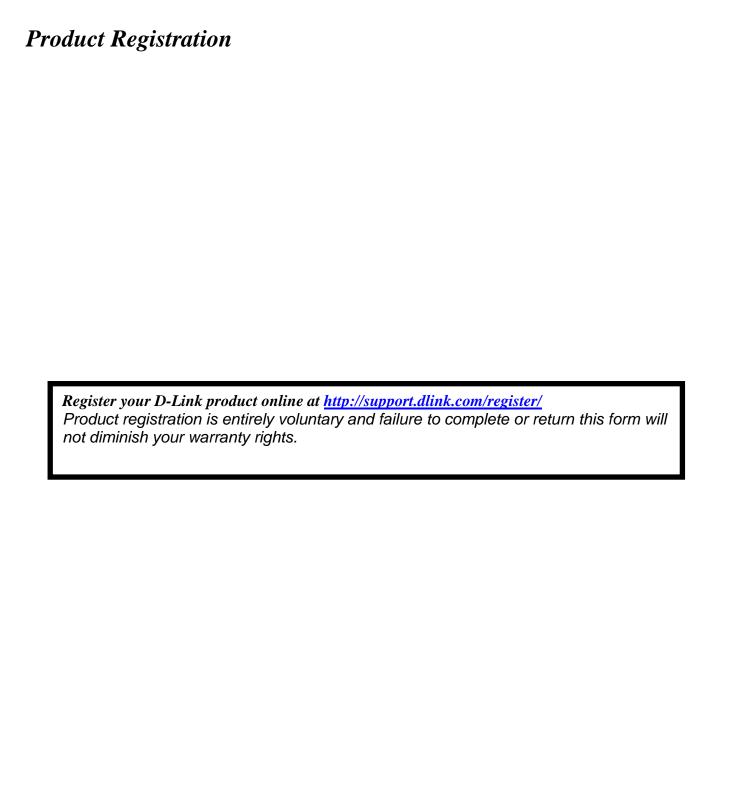

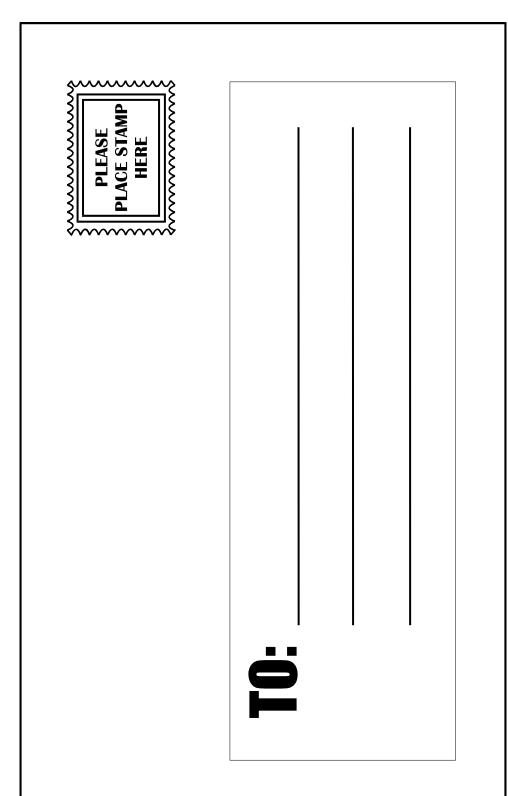
